My Dear Friends,

It is a joy to be able to welcome you to Saint Matthew's Cathedral on this glorious Feast of Easter. I do so in the name of Cardinal Robert McElroy, as well as in my own.

Of all the times we gather as Christian believers, none is more important than this one. Easter is the greatest of all our feasts. 




